


**His Majesty King Hussein bin Talal

and he abdicated in Hussein's favour.**





or in plain clothes, as we see here presenting his eldest son, Prince Abdullah (named after the king's grandfather) with his paratrooper's "wings" on his son's graduation. Prince Abdullah was appointed Crown Prince on his father's return to Amman, and succeeded to his father's throne.

Thank you for visiting my short tribute to His Majesty King Hussein bin Talal. My Jordanian connection is through my late uncle, Brigadier J.O.M. ("Teal") Ashton who commanded 3rd Brigade of the Arab Legion based at Ramallah from 1948 to 1954 under the well known and respected General Sir John Bagot Glubb ("Glubb Pasha").

Ashton Pasha died in September 1998.

The name of the Royal Jordanian Army and the Royal Jordanian Air Force was "The Arab Legion" from its foundation during World War I until the 1970s.

In a brief visit to Palestine in 1990, I was privileged to make the acquaintance of a Jordanian military associate of my uncle from 35 years before, and I have been able to piece together some of my family history as a result.

My thanks also go to the Jordanian ambassador in Australia at the time of King Hussein's 40th anniversary of his succession, for his warm friendship, particularly as that was also the 40th anniversary of the Qibya massacre for which my uncle personally took full responsibility.

The illustrations on this web page, apart from the black-and-white postcard (from my uncle's effects) and the portion of a portrait of King Abdullah (also from my late uncle's treasures), all come from a book "King and Country" which was a photographic tribute to King Hussein by Amman photographer Zohrab Markarian to celebrate His Majesty's fiftieth birthday, and this web page has been put together hurriedly without any opportunity for copyright permission from the photographer.

The morning after this site was created, opportunity was taken to seek the verbal approval of the Ambassador to Australia of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan to post this tribute.
